Organization Centered Standards

- Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI)
- Responsibility of Management (ROM)
- Facility Management and Safety (FMS)
- Human Resource Management (HRM)
- Information Management System(IMS)



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Scope of Coverage of Structural Standards for Ayurveda Hospitals

- ▶ Essential Services /Minimum Assured Services
- ▶ Infrastructural/equipment/staff specifications for hospital/sections relating to Panchakarma, Uttarbasti, Ksharasutra, Leech therapy
- ▶ Specific Structural Standards for
 - ▶ Ayurveda Hospitals that are less than 100 bed
 - ▶ Ayurveda Hospitals that are 100 bed and above
 - ▶ Ayurveda Hospitals attached to Medical Colleges
- ▶ Ayurveda Hospital Categories
 - ▶ 10-49 Beds
 - ▶ 50-99 Beds
 - ▶ 100-200 Beds
 - ▶ 201 and above Beds

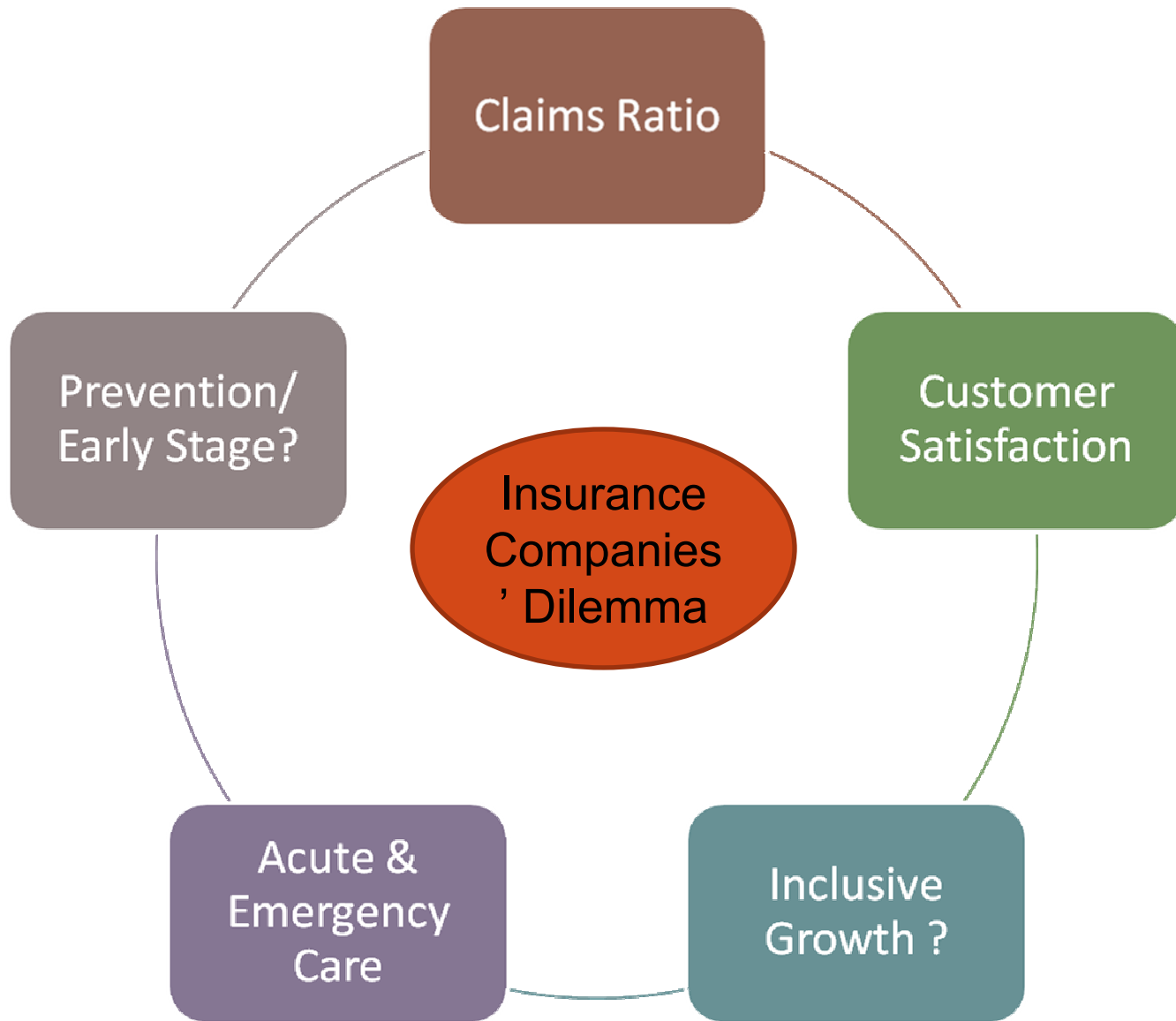

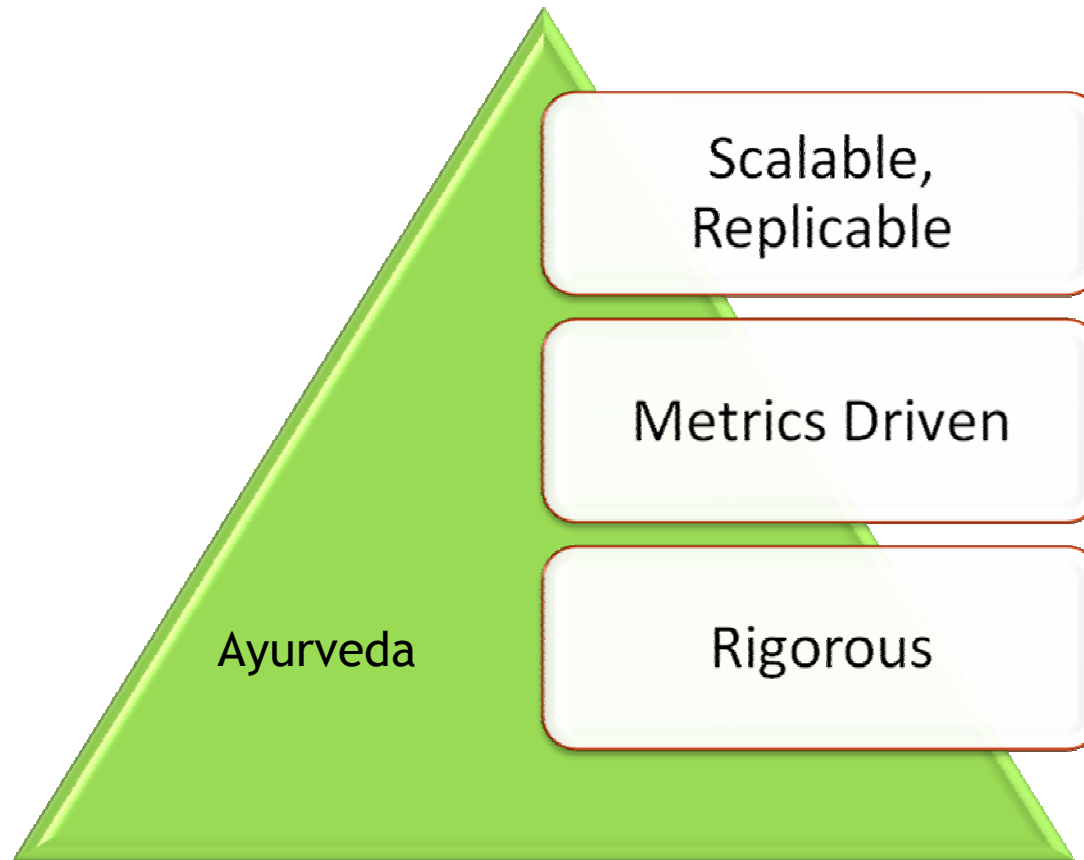
